- Match fiber types:** Ensure both ends are multimode fibers with the same core size (e.g., 50/125 μm or 62.5/125 μm) to avoid signal loss.
- Check TX/RX alignment:** When connecting to devices like switches or media converters, verify that the transmit (TX) and receive (RX) paths are correctly aligned.
- Clean fiber ends:** Dust or dirt can significantly degrade performance; always clean fiber ends before connecting.
- Protect the connection:** Use protective sleeves or enclosures to prevent mechanical stress or environmental damage.
