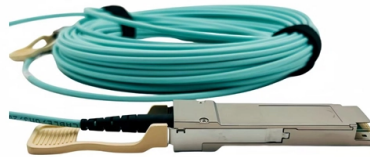


How to identify the model number of an optical cable connector

- UPC (Ultra Physical Contact):** Flat-polished ferrule, typically blue, lower insertion loss but higher back reflection.
- APC (Angled Physical Contact):** Angled ferrule, typically green, minimizes back reflection ().

Step 5: Use Tools for Verification

- Fiber connector inspection microscope:** Check ferrule end-face for polish type, dust, scratches, or defects.
- Connector identification charts:** Compare physical characteristics and color coding to confirm the exact model ().

Step 6: Reference Standards and Documentation

- For precise model numbers, consult TIA/EIA standards such as FOCIS-5 for MPO connectors or SFF-8024 for module identifiers ().
