Loop the strength member through a pulling eye, double-back, and secure it with tape or a knot to ensure a safe pull (). Pulling Techniques Conduit Pulls: Maintain proper sidewall pressure and avoid jamming by respecting the conduit's fill ratio and bend radius. Use breakaway pull swivels or tension-monitoring devices for long or difficult pulls (). Pre-Terminated Cables: Use a pulling sleeve or mesh around connectors, attaching it securely to the cable according to manufacturer guidelines. Never attach the sleeve directly to connectors to prevent disconnection during the pull (). Bend Radius: Adhere to the minimum bend radius specified for the cable type. Modern bend-insensitive fibers may allow radii as small as 4.4 mm, while older fibers may require 30 mm or more ().
